TIMINGS: The guided tour of Birkenhead Park by park ranger Scott Brennan will take 1.5 hours starting from outside the Visitor Centre at 10.00am. Please be ready to start walking at 10.00. There will be a couple of further short talks. The group will move on to Birkenhead Priory and lunch can be eaten at either venue. Please contact Ann for further details.

THE VISIT will include: Morning: After Scott Brennan's guided tour, Mark Adams will talk a little bit about the investigations into the Spitfire crash site, and Roy Forshaw will provide information from old maps, showing how the landscape was altered to create the park.

Afternoon: At the Priory, you can explore on your own or join one of the free guided walks that are provided every Sunday afternoon starting at 1.00pm or 2.00pm (no need to book)

FYI: Birkenhead Industrial History venues: The MAS Events team had originally planned to visit one or two industrial heritage venues in Birkenhead, following on from Dean Paton's MAS talk about Big Heritage's plans to promote them. This is a national (England) event, so if you are somewhere else in England in early to mid-September, it's worth checking to see if there's anything of interest there.

There are almost 100 in-person events in Merseyside and similar numbers in Cheshire, Lancashire, Greater Manchester etc.

Weekend of Friday 8th – Sun 10th Sept Sue will be visiting **St Helen's Church, Sefton**, Bridges Lane, Sefton Village, Liverpool, Merseyside, L29 7WG

Sue can arrange to pick up people who need to travel by train and shuttle them between the venue and Blundellsands & Crosby station (Merseyrail, Northern Line from Hunts Cross to Southport).

This is an informal 'come and join me if you'd like to' sort of fieldtrip!

The exact date and time will be decided by Sue after people have contacted her to express interest. The Grade I listed church was founded in 1170 but the oldest fabric is 14th C and most is early 16th C. There are brasses and a lot of fine carved wood including the 19th/20th C ceiling, Tudor screens, choir stalls, pews and Mouseman

furniture (made by Robert Thompson).

Dramatic new digital reconstructions of two of Wales's most vulnerable prehistoric coastal forts have just been completed, vividly bringing to life the Iron Age and Roman defended villages in photo-realistic detail.

Dinas Dinlle coastal fort near Caernarfon in Gwynedd, and Caerfai coastal promontory fort near St David's in Pembrokeshire, both owned by the National Trust, are threatened with coastal erosion and cliff loss. Increased storminess and intense rainfall, coupled with predicted rises in sea-level due to climate change, are steadily eroding the fragile archaeology at both these sites.

The EU-funded **CHERISH Project** has worked closely with a team of artists in Wessex Archaeology, and a range of stakeholders and experts, to accurately reconstruct both these sites in their heydays.

I don't usually include academic papers, but two people have recommended this to me in the past two days (!). Thanks to Brian Higgins for providing the link.

Rachel Pope of the University of Liverpool Archaeology Department and **Mairi H Davies** of Historic Environment Scotland (the Scottish equivalent of Cadw & Historic England) have published an open access article reinstating the fine academic reputation of Peggy Piggott, whose important role at Sutton Hoo (and many other archaeological sites) was unfairly downplayed in the 2021 film 'The Dig'.
