In 2012 a <u>Roman hoard</u> was discovered just outside of Knutsford and reported to the <u>Portable Antiquities Scheme</u> at the Museum of Liverpool. The hoard consists of 103 coins, three stunning brooches and two finger rings.

NB japanning was a process used in the decorative arts that tried to imitate the celebrated lacquering of the Japanese. It was popular in 18th-century Europe for finishing and ornamenting wood, leather, tin, and papier-mâché
